

Focus areas of VIKSIT **BHARAT BUDGET**

The interim budget raised allocations to the government's six so-called "core of core schemes" to rs.1.12 lakh crore for 2024-25 from revised estimates (2023-24) of rs1.08 lakh crore, an increase of 3%.

When compared with the budget estimates (2023-24) of Rs86,144 crore, the outlay for the next fiscal year for these programmes represents a 30% jump.




